What is techification?

Hendrikse et al. (2022) define the “Big Techification of Everything” as

- “a scenario whereby Big Tech not only comes to rewire economy and society, but also enmeshes itself evermore with the state, effectively becoming the sun in the new socio-technical solar system” (p.60)

- Alphabet/Google
- Apple
- Amazon
- Facebook/Meta
- Microsoft
- Alibaba
- Tencent

It was a surprise to learn the extent & inequitable use of Big Tech for education.

Methods & Participants

- Qualitative interviews
- 14 principals
- Experience in virtual schools
- Ontario, Canada

Virtual schools

- Publicly funded
- Synchronous learning
- Entirely online
- Opened during pandemic
- Some have become permanent

How is Big Tech used?

Google Suite as a virtual learning platform

I didn't mandate D2L [...] because many of them are not comfortable, so they're using the Google classroom [...] we had **too many teachers that were learning too quickly** and were not comfortable.



How is Big Tech used?

Chromebooks as board-provided devices

We provide **anyone who wants or needs, anyone who asks**, with a Chromebook, a headset, and a mic. No questions asked about background or need, it's just a matter of right.



How is Big Tech used?

Hāpara used to monitor students

A teacher can see, when Hāpara Highlights is on, that a student is not doing their work when they're on a Board issued Chromebook. So **clearly, those are the kids that aren't engaged.**



So What?

Techification of Education

- Digital literacy becomes Google literacy
- School data is commodified

So What?

Exacerbating educational inequity

- Hāpara more likely to monitor BIPOC, low SES, or at risk students
- These students will be held to a higher standard than their peers

Recommendations

- Provide enhanced training on board-supported programming
- Institute 1:1 device programs for all students
- Apply monitoring software equally to all students, if at all
